The amount requested is to employ a contract Market Coordinator for the 2020 season.
The Market Coordinator's duties (under the supervision of the volunteer board) are:
1 - Manage email, and Social Media accounts
2 - Collect the fees from both Seasonal and Drop in Vendors
3 - Set up and supervise the Sunday Market.
4 - Collect Vendor information for Market improvements
5 - Coordinate the weekly music
6 - Assist with Administrative duties as needed

The current hourly rate is \$20 per hour for 125 hours in the season

Implications for the Organization if this Grant is not approved:
Through receiving the grant we were able to establish ourselves in 2019 and build a reliable reputation as part of the Ucluelet landscape. The grant allowed us to employ a Market Coordinator which was invaluable when it came to coordinating, supervising , communicating with and establishing good relationships with the Vendors; bringing a welcoming positive energy and consistency to the Market. We continue to draw steady foot traffic throughout the Market, regardless of weather and draw tremendous support from the Community through attendance and in our Social Media presence.
Without the Grant we would be unable to employ a Market Coordinator and all of the good work and momentum that we have established over the last 2 seasons would be jeopardized. The additional workload on the board would diminish their ability to focus on raising the Market's profile and could adversely effect the Market's ability to grow and to sustain the growth that it has obtained.

How Many People do you expect to serve by this application

FBOTE provides an average of 50 individual hampers, 40 family hampers, and 50 top up hampers per month.

Who are the people to benefit from your activity or functions?

- All registered food bank clients in Ucluelet, Tofino and the five surrounding First Nations.
- Any student of the USS or UES who attends any of the programs listed under services above
- Any community member who attends the weekly community lunch at the West Coast Community Resource Centre.

-The Food bank free store is available to all community members

Activities or Functions to be Supported by this application

The grant-in-aid request of \$2,000 would be used to purchase food at times of the year when donated food items are depleted. FBOTE is generously supported by food donations from our community; however, the majority of donated non-perishable food is received in the October food drive and in December.

In- Kind Request

Request the use of the UAC Hall one day in December 2020 to assemble the Christmas hampers.

Implication for the Organization if this application is not approved? Would the project occur?

If this funding is not approved the FBOTE would explore other avenues for funding or would undertake an additional fundraiser in our community. If funding sources such as the Grant-in-Aid are no longer available, the board would have to re-evaluate the grant we currently support for the WCRS and/or the financial support of the school programs.


RE: Central Westcoast Forest Society's Grant in Aid Application

Dear Mayor and Council;

Thank you for accepting Central Westcoast Forest Society's (CWFS) Grant in Aid application for a bat box building workshop and speaker series. CWFS is a registered charity based in Ucluelet, BC. The purposes of CWFS are the protection, conservation and enhancement of the natural environment through restoration of aquatic and forest ecosystems, education, employment and stewardship. In 2020 we aim to host a Bat Festival where we can bring attention to the many amazing bat species living on the west coast and the important roles they play in our local ecosystem. As part of this Bat Festival we hope to host a bat box building workshop and series of educational events. Locals and tourist will be invited to join for a day of building bat boxes and learning about bat species on the coast; we also aim to host a series of workshops and speakers (professionals from PRNPR and universities) throughout Ucluelet, ideally using the George Fraser Room as a space for speakers to present.

Frank Witter and Megan Francis from CWFS will host the bat box building workshop and will facilitate the speakers. Once bat boxes are complete, they will be installed in the riparian area of our restoration sites to provide roosting sites for the bats living within these watersheds; these boxes also help us gain a broader understanding of bat populations utilizing the watersheds we are working to restore as we are able to collect guano (feces) from roosting sites.

We are hoping that the District of Ucluelet will help to support this event through a financial contribution of \$3,425 (see below for budget breakdown) and an in-kind contribution of one full day of Activity Room and one full day of the George Fraser Room rental at the Ucluelet

Raincoast Field School - Overview for Ucluelet

“The goal of the Raincoast Field School is to increase outdoor learning opportunities for students in the communities of Barkley and Clayoquot Sound”



What is Raincoast Field School?

Most students in BC learn about nature and the environment in a classroom. Here on the West Coast of Vancouver Island, we are lucky to live in one of the most pristine and beautiful ecosystems in the world; a place where nature is right outside, where rubber boots are often a better teaching tool than a textbook.

Raincoast Field School takes science out of the classroom and into the forest, the ocean, the beach or the bog.... places where students can touch and feel and listen and learn, right in their own backyards.

Raincoast Field School is an outdoor experiential learning program designed to meet BC curricular outcomes while providing hands-on learning opportunities throughout the school year. The program is developed in collaboration with the teachers at the Ucluelet Elementary School, and delivered by the Raincoast Education Society.





Field trips and activities are led by a qualified full-time instructor with extensive experience as a science educator, and encompass multiple aspects of curricular outcomes including science, numeracy and literacy. Many outings also feature traditional Aboriginal knowledge provided by a Nuuchah-nulth Cultural Educator.


The Raincoast Field School has been running in Tofino since it was established in 2014, and in Ucluelet since 2018. The program currently provides programming to all 12 classes at Wickaninnish Community School in Tofino, and all 11 classes at Ucluelet Elementary School in Ucluelet, offering

over 200 field trips per school year in total. The response from students, parents, teachers, and school administrators has been overwhelmingly enthusiastic. Each and every student from K to 7 in both Tofino and Ucluelet will get to participate in at least one field trip every single month of every single school year through this program!

The Raincoast Field School curriculum is designed to build upon itself year after year, and offering this programming represents a significant long-term commitment to the students. Our Ucluelet Field School Coordinator is a highly skilled educator in a full-time roll with the Raincoast Education Society, committed to the program, and the community she teaches in.

Support and Funding

As a registered Canadian charity, we depend on a variety of funding sources. Every year, our educational and research programs are supported through donations (local businesses, foundations and trusts, and individuals), grants (government and non-government), fundraising events (our biggest is the Lantern Festival), as well as program revenue we generate (registration for our courses, camp fees, and event admissions). In addition to direct financial support, we are fortunate to have the support of so many local businesses and organizations who donate in-kind to support our work.



The Raincoast Field School is offered at Ucluelet Elementary School at no cost to the students or the school. This program costs almost \$48,000 per year to deliver in Ucluelet.

Last year, on average, the Wild Pacific Trail Society saw **750,000** individuals utilize various sections of the Trail. These statistics include local residents and visitors alike. Statistics for our educational programming, was an astounding **5,107** meaningful interactions (2019 education report attached). This number included guided walks, the Discovery Tent at the Lighthouse, and roving. School group numbers totalled 200. We anticipate an increase in numbers for 2020 reaching well into the 6,000 range for educational participation.

Who are the people to benefit from your activity or functions?

The people that will benefit from our educational programming are local residents, seniors, school-aged children and visitors to the area.

Activity or Functions to be supported by this application:

Education Pilot Program for 2020:

WPTS is hoping to expand our seasonal educational programs to a year-round calendar of events.

1. **Senior specific programming** will be developed and offered, tailored to their needs as indicated by the residents of Forest Glen.
2. **Outdoor learning for students** in our local public schools will be an area of anticipated growth with the hope of developing a **youth training program for interpretive naturalists** (especially First Nations).
3. New Topic specific events that will attract locals and visitors. Such as our planned **BAT WEEKEND**.

Pilot project support will also help us expand:

- Guided Walks:** led primarily by our Trail Naturalist, plus partners (Ucluelet Aquarium, Raincoast Education Society, Central Westcoast Forest Society) and special guests. See our education report. Programs will be offered March to September, an expanded season.
- Special Events:** in collaboration with other local organizations such as the Pacific Rim Whale Festival Society, Strawberry Isle Marine Research Society and WildSafe BC.
- Discovery Tent:** at the Amphitrite Lighthouse that serves as a welcome hub for visitors and houses our interactive educational displays and materials.
- Roving:** Our Naturalist delivers face to face communication to engage trail users informally.
- School Groups:** offering local and visiting groups interpretive programming. Plus long-term studies (i.e. monitor wildlife, bio-blitz & field studies). Stewardship is also a key take away.
- Training of guides** from all organizations and students delivering walks.

WPTS spending for education has grown from a \$22,000 in 2018 to \$41,000 in 2019! Our plans are projected to exceed \$50,000 for 2020 if sources of funding can be secured.

Implications for the Organization if this application is not approved. Would the project occur if partial funds were awarded?

If this application is not approved or if partial funds were awarded, the Wild Pacific Trail Society's educational programs would be scaled back. Our ability to expand into school groups and senior programming, would be limited.



Guided Walks

Our programs are continually expanding, and the diversity of topics is very exciting. This year developing and delivering the "Talking Trees and Magic Moss Walk" was such a treat. We received great feedback throughout the season from visitors and participants from our local community as we explored how trees communicate through the underground network of mycelium (fungus root web). It was really fascinating to explore new developments in mycelium being used in insulation, packing peanuts and even used to make surfboards!

Exploring further connections between trees, mosses and lichens led us to identifying some really cool species along the Browns Beach section of trail. My favourite quote from trail users was from a couple that shared,

"We've walked this section of trail every day for the last 30 years, and we've never seen that!" – Ucluelet Family commenting on lichens we explored at Browns Beach

There are some pretty amazing and beautiful species that you really have to take the time to stop and investigate, and that's one of the great features of a guided walk. I can't wait to see what programs we come up with next.

Continuing from last year, the popular Tidepool walk was delivered and during high tides was adapted to a tidepool and shoreline explore with highlight of the Mystery Shipwreck at Big Beach. We joined forces with the Aquarium as they delivered tidepool programs

most Fridays from June until the end of August.

The Beneath the Bog walk was delivered again this year with the Sundews making their appearance from May until late September.

Coastal Sea Wolves walk made its debut this year on Saturdays in April, with visitors sharing their excitement towards programs being offered so early in the season. We

partnered again with Wildsafe BC to deliver messaging, community updates and free bookmarks & colouring books.


Special Guests

Silva Johansson led her popular Shipwreck walk throughout the summer; once in July and September, and twice in August.

Seabird Special was a new program this year led by local Bird Expert Ian Cruickshank. This program kicked off Migratory Bird day 10am at the Lighthouse as we watched for sea birds on migration. Spotting scope and binoculars were provided by Ian, but participants were encouraged to bring their own as well. The program was continued once a month in June, July and August.

Karen Topham delivered her Rock n' Roll Geology Walk again this summer, once in July and once in September. Karen and I have been brainstorming new ideas to create more engaging props ie. I am working on replicating rock layering using pieces of foam to show movement in plate tectonics.

This May we partnered with the Raincoast Education Society (RES) to deliver the "Amazing Bog" program. This was a special guest tour led by the Tofino Grade 7 Student Teachers in the Bog(photo below). Ucluelet Grade 4 students attended the trail walk the week before to learn from the Grade 7s and complete Bog Biome Booklets (activity booklets) created by RES.

Andy Mackinnon led a fantastic mushroom walk with over 30 people. He volunteered his time to offer this special walk during his visit for the WPT 20th Anniversary Celebration (photo below).



Central Westcoast Forest Society: Rainforest Walk – delivered a rainforest ecology walk on various topics based on student experience. Students requested more time and training to work on programs; we split the Interp 101 Training with Silva Johansson to one day on the trail and one day in the classroom, it was noted this was appreciated and now preferred for future by participants.

Raincoast Education Society: Rainforest Walk – Ariane Batic delivered most; a rainforest ecology walk from Whale lot to lighthouse.

Challenges: Buckets and nets for tidepool program were quick to rust and fall apart.

Opportunities:

Re: Tidepools- Upon discussion with Aquarium it has been decided for future tidepool programs that buckets, nets, etc. will **not** be used and minimal contact with species is encouraged to reduce stress of creatures.

Re: Seabird Special; A spotting scope would greatly increase audience participation. Ian was able to provide his scope and Don Ferris kindly donated his for use during special events. However, being able to have a scope at the Discovery Tent at all times would be a great addition to programming as well as very handy during Discovery Tent or Roving days (whale spotting, birds, etc).

Discovery Tent

The Discovery Tent was a first point of contact for many as they arrived at the Amphitrite Lighthouse. The Ambassador greeted them and shared various props or photos of flora and fauna on the trail, recent sightings, trail history, current initiatives, proposed future, was asked various questions about geography, history, ecosystem connections, etc. Ambassador provided knowledge of surrounding areas, attractions, nearest location of bathrooms, doggie bags, promoted free naturalist programs, collected monetary donations and gave out free by donation stickers and karma cards. Local donation of native plants and plant pots by gifted by CWFS and by local residents to display plants at Discovery Tent; native plant garden.

New this year was the purchase of the Wild Pacific Trail-er. This was an excellent facility used as a bad weather shelter for the trail naturalist's health and safety, storage for teaching materials and props such as heavy whale bones and was utilized as support for program delivery by the WPTS and our partners. Naturalist and partners would be able to store, access and share additional props, maps, charts, guide books etc if people had questions relating to any topic at one convenient location at the Lighthouse.

A new tidepool point duty program was created with touch and feel displays all about tidepools (rocks, shells, etc that people could explore). This was a great teaching opportunity to share conservation and protection messages; to not collect species "Take only pictures leave only footprints," - all props would be returned to Big Beach following the presentation. Hook, "What have you seen at the beach?" Partnered with Surfrider Pac Rim to deliver plastic free ocean messaging and shared date/times of ocean clean ups.

A new Native Slugs of the Wild Pacific Trail display was created this year using life size model slugs! Sharing information about characteristics, habitat, fun facts as well as importance to ecosystem. Hook, "Have you seen a slug today?"

Special guest drop in program by Wildsafe BC Bob Hansen. Bob brought various scat, skulls and tracks from coastal mammals as well as Wildsafe BC colouring books, brochures, stickers and tattoos to hand out (photo below).





Challenges: Whiteboard for "what did you see today" was a nuisance to clean daily even with special spray. Tanya can research techniques or brainstorm other ideas.

Many people still going down the staircase/ hopping the District gate to the lighthouse and surrounding rocky shoreline areas. Liability concern; request for gate and signage at top of stairs across from Discovery Tent.

Opportunities: The trailer allowed for longer and more enjoyable engagements at the lighthouse. I was able to store emergency water, first aid kit, props and guidebooks at all times for access. Also graciously provided an area to take a break between programs.

Roving

Naturalist on-location program: personalized face to face communication throughout various locations on the trail. Provided doggie bags, bandaids, WPT trail maps, PRNPR maps, Tofino and Ucluelet maps. Searched for signs of wildlife to share with trail users (tracks, scat, spouts, etc), identified birds, species of slugs, berries, fungi, bushes, trees, etc. Often walked around with various props to "hook" trail users/engage visitors. Props included wolf skull, scat, track castings. Took photos during roving for social media pages (Facebook and Instagram, as well as photos to use in programs and discovery tent).

Challenges: Need to find a more durable backpack; small and waterproof – first aid kit could also be condensed.

Opportunities: Reach out to MEC grants or potential sponsorship opportunities by local businesses for gear. This could be a great opportunity to explore for desired WPT vests by Special Guests.


Special Events

Wild Pacific Trail Whale Week (total participants 663)
Partnered with Parks Canada, Raincoast Education Society, Strawberry Isle Build a Whale and Silva Johannson. Delivered free guided interpretive whale walks, drop in activities for all ages at the lighthouse, whale spotting with scopes at the lighthouse, Pass of Melfort Shipwreck Theatre show at the Community Centre. This was an extremely well attended week for programs. (Whale week booth pictured on right)



Ukee Days! Participated as a booth on Saturday and Sunday, exploring intertidal regions and species in our local area/on the trail. Created a new ocean zone exhibit where participants could touch, feel and move creatures around in the display as they tried to identify the correct ocean zone they live in. The “hook” was to ask people as they walked by, if they would like to try to match the species to their home. This engaged all ages and was a fun new addition to the booth. Clues were throughout the table to assist in guessing and an interactive touch tank of shells, rocks, etc was also created to have participants engage and enjoy various species found at Big Beach. This also advertised our tidepool walks and shared a glimpse of what the programs entail. All species, shells,

rocks, etc were returned back to their habitat at the end of season (Photo below).



Special Tours – District of Ucluelet Summer Camps and Raincoast Education Society – Ocean Camp, Pirate Program! Phil Hood and his entire family, myself, all dressed up as pirates and lead a district of Ucluelet kids camp – treasure hunt with clues and map around the lighthouse loop, all about shipwrecks and stories of survival , complete with “ buried treasure” for all! - Phil would love to do again!

NEST Weaving Retreat Wolf Walk: The Westcoast NEST requested a repeat in programming offered last year as part of the weaving retreat they hosted in the community. A wolf walk was delivered for 15 participates (up last year compared to 6) during 1 hour along the lighthouse loop.

Strawberry Isle Marine Research Society Partnerships:

Build-A-Whale is an interactive program that aims to educate participants about marine biology, anatomy, evolutionary science and conservation. We are so fortunate to be able to have such a unique interactive program in our community. This program allows participants to interact hand-on with real orca bones and create an entire orca skeleton; interacting with species in our local ecosystems, inspiring joy, conservation and protection.

To personally witness the success of this program in our community and the excitement it brings amongst the locals and visitors afar when advertising the program is such a pleasure. Faces light up with intrigue, "real orca bones!" and I've seen the success through the personal connections made by the Strawberry Isle staff. I hope that the program is able to expand and increase throughout the season because we recognize how valuable this program is for all ages, to be able to have a program that moves around and meets the needs of ours and of other communities on the island.

This year we expanded our partnership with Strawberry Ilse to deliver Citizen Science programs to contribute data towards Sea Star Monitoring. From SIMIRS website; "The goal of this project is to survey the sea star populations at four locations once a month at low tide. This will help us get an idea of the spread of the disease and the population demographics within the sites. Data will be collected on number, size, and disease progression for each sea star found in the designated area. Our methods are based on those from the [Pacific Rocky Intertidal Monitoring Lab](#) out of UCSC, and our data will contribute to their larger project." This took place monthly at Big Beach-June, July and August. Surveys took up to 1 hour in a designated plot. Data was submitted monthly.

"We have been analyzing data from this year's Tidepool Guardian project where together with our 4 partner organizations and 91 volunteers we surveyed 5,263 sea stars between May & September! Out of the total number of sea stars surveyed 2% had wasting disease across six species. Stay tuned for the full report coming soon! 2019 SEA STAR SURVEYS

As a keystone species, sea stars play an important ecological role in the intertidal zone. Sea Star Wasting Syndrome has drastically reduced sea star populations across the Pacific Northwest. Since 2015 SIMRS has been monitoring regional sea star health and document the spread of this disease.

- 2%** of visible sea stars had wasting syndrome in 2019
- 5,263** sea stars were surveyed by **91** volunteers between May & September
- 6** different species of sea stars were found with wasting syndrome

Wild Pacific Trail Bioblitz - BioBlitz in partnership with Ucluelet Aquarium, CWFS and Guest expert birder Deb Obrist. Special thanks to Ucluelet Aquarium, Zoes Bakery and Pina styles for prize donations. Special thanks to Jess Edwards for her help with coordination and amazing poster creation. This was a new program this year that focused on citizen science. Citizen science is a great way to work towards a collection of data to help determine the health of an ecosystem. It's a way anyone from the public can meaningfully contribute to your local community in a collective project. In projects like the Bioblitz, the data can help us better understand the natural world as we took photos and attempted to catalogue as many species as we could along the Wild Pacific Trail. Researchers now have a "snapshot" of as many living things as we could find in that day; data that can be used for future projects and determining environmental health with the iNaturalist App. Over 500 species were ID'd on the trail this day. All parties have expressed interest in an annual Bioblitz and Strawberry Isle would like to co-host and



expand the program at Big Beach in 2020 using data collected towards their research partners at MARINE (Multi Agency Rocky Intertidal Network, UC Santa Cruz) to add to their database across North America.

Wildsafe BC Weekend - Partnership with Wildsafe BC, Thorton Hatchery, Parks Canada and Raincoast Education Society. A whole weekend of wildlife events on the trail – Silva delivered a Bear Walk, Tanya a Sea Wolf Walk in collaboration with events being offered at Thorton Hatchery. Bob Hansen was the lead for coordinating.

Special Events Cont'd: Outreach

Tanya as Guest Speaker at Forest Glen Seniors Luncheon (public event) Wednesday September 18th 2019. It was brought up by Forest Glen that many residents do not often embark on the trail so an effort was made to bring the trail to them, encourage folks to go out onto the trail, and learn all about fun creatures that live in our area. Naturalist provided various educational props and program materials (wolf skull, scat, tracks, slug of the WPT display, brochures, calendar of WPT programs. Outreach opportunity to engage and specially reach out to seniors to also brainstorm senior oriented program ideas talking in to consideration specific mobility concerns that were brought up. Tanya has since reached out to Forest Glen and expressed interest for collaboration in 2020 programming.



Outreach: NEST as Wild Pacific Trail representative – Connecting people, place and planet; professional development conference at UBC Vancouver. Nicole brought trail brochures, maps, Naturalist's business cards, along with various education props (wolf scat, skull, tracks).

Challenges:

Re: Sea Star Surveys; alternate locations may need to be explored. He-Tin-Kis could be an alternative (easier to access low tide region). Seaweed was quite thick during the lower tides of Big Beach. Terrace Beach could also be a great alternative. Karyssa with SIMIRS has expressed interest to follow up with this and join myself in a review of locations.

Re: Special Guests; Wild Pacific Trail logo gear is requested by special guests to be able to be identifiable (we tried name tags this year but they are requesting future ID such as a light weight vest).

Opportunities:

Cathy and Zoe at Forest Glen expressed great gratitude and acknowledgement of potential for senior specific programming on the trail, tailoring a walk to address indicated needs of seniors.




Figure 1. Comparison of total participation per month from 2018 and 2019




Figure 2. Total participation by month per program for 2018




Figure 3. Total participation by month per program for 2019
